CYCLE ROUTES IN THE STOUR VALLEY

Cycling through a Masterpiece

provides a number of interesting routes through the Stour Valley which take you to numerous locations of historical importance and past enchanting views.

There are 14 routes altogether, ranging from 6 miles to 19 miles. The circular routes start and finish in Clare, Hartest Green, Long Melford, Bures, Stoke by Nayland and Dedham. At each location, there is an option for a longer 'touring route' and a shorter route. The routes are also designed to enable the keen cyclist to link them together easily to create a truly challenging ride. A summary of the routes, along with their starting and finishing points, is given on the map overleaf. Many of the points of interest are open to the public and we strongly recommend that you check for opening times before you set out in order to get the most out of your ride.

The Painters' Trail

The landscape of Dedham Vale and the Stour Valley has inspired many great artists, including Thomas Gainsborough, Alfred Munnings, and John Constable, whose deep connection with the area lends it its other name: Constable Country. The Painters' Trail is a long distance circular route that takes you through this Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, stopping off at major artistic landmarks on the way and cycling through the scenery that

inspired some of the world's greatest landscape painters. One particular highlight of art heritage cyclists will see on the route, is Flatford Mill and the stretch of the Stour where Constable painted 'The Haywain', one of the best-known pastoral scenes ever committed to canvas.



The ride rarely strays far from the River Stour, which forms the border between Essex and Suffolk, and flows gently from west to east where its estuary eventually joins the North Sea. The surrounding countryside is picturebook England, with lush green riverbanks and meadows, rolling farmland, and many thatched roofs, not to mention an abundance of pretty weatherboard and half-timbered houses.

The full route of The Painters Trail is 69 miles through rolling Essex and Suffolk country lanes, but the route can very easily be shortened or broken up into a multi-day ride. The lack of major hills and abundance of quiet roads, apart from a few short stretches of A-road, make the route suitable for most fitness and confidence levels.

The starting point for The Painters' Trail is in Manningtree, although Sudbury is

another recommended alternative. Both are easily accessible by train.


Travel tip


Travel by train! Manningtree station is on the main line from London (Liverpool Street) with frequent services to Colchester, Ipswich and Norwich. From Marks Tey, just south of Colchester, you can take the picturesque Gainsborough Line for a relaxed journey to Sudbury. Both stations and routes are served by Greater Anglia, and you can bring your bike onboard. Check the Greater Anglia website for details of its cycle policy:

Cycle Safety

- Ensure your bike is in good working order before you set off on your trip.
- Go well equipped. Take a mobile phone, a puncture repair kit and pump, a first aid kit and refreshments.
- Be seen, wear high visibility clothing.
- Ride in single file on busy roads.
- Be aware of, and follow the Highway Code
- Wear a cycle helmet.
- Let other road users know your intentions give clear hand signals.
- Listen out for other traffic and be considerate of other road users, pedestrians and horses.

The Stour Valley is an exciting and beautiful landscape that has captured people's imagination for centuries. A quintessential English landscape with rolling farmland, ancient woodland, meadows, hedgerows and meandering river, the valley is predominately used for arable farming but dotted throughout the Stour Valley are historic, picturesque towns and villages, many of which have church towers that can be seen across the landscape. At the heart of the valley is the River Stour which creates a natural border between Suffolk and Essex.

The network of quiet roads, sunken lanes, well-surfaced tracks and cycle paths mean it's easy and accessible to explore this beauty by bicycle. This leaflet will signpost you to cycle routes and services (including bike sales, repairs and organised cycle break and tour providers) in and around the Stour Valley, and help inspire you to get out and discover this special landscape on two wheels.


